Mr. Craig Daniels - Hearing Life


Clinician Craig Daniels was our guest speaker on 11 April at the Royal Hotel, Harrisville. Craig has been working as an Audiometrist for the past 7 years and commenced working for Hearing Life about three and a half years ago. Craig began his career in a small clinic about 12 years ago where he was a computer support technician and did hearing aid repairs. His interest in helping clients to lead better lives, and be able to hear better gave him the motivation to become qualified and he did this through TAFE NSW while working full time. Craig started his talk with saying "If you can't hear, you lose the context of the environment you're in". Most of us probably don't

think about this much, but for those who cannot hear can often feel left out and not included on what is happening due to their hearing loss. If you can hear you feel like you are a part of the environment. Technology has progressed a lot over the years and it can now even be adapted to tune into hearing aids to improve the quality of life for the hearing impaired. Craig said hearing is one area of our health areas that we let 'slide' and don't get check as regularly as they should. There are four degrees of hearing loss - Mild / Moderate / Severe / Profound. Hearing loss can be caused by many different things and on average it takes seven years for people to recognize that they



have a hearing problem and decide to go and get it checked out. Hearing loss can occur at any age, but is more prominent with age.









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Boonah locals Jim & Jeannette Grounds were our ANZAC Day speakers on 2th April, they were fortunate to have travelled to Israel for the 100th Anniversary of the Charge of Beersheba. Jim & Jeannette were late additions to the tour, so they were only able to see the commemorations on a

big screen in an auditorium at the British War Cemetery at Beersheba. A large crowd gathered for the momentous occasion, which was a moving experience with some excellent speeches by the Israeli Prime Minister, Benjamin Netanyahu, Australian Prime Minister Malcom Turnbull, and the Govenor General of New Zealand, Dame Patsy Reddy. Jim recorded the ceremony & the reenactment of the charge on his camera, which he shared with us.

Exactly 100 years ago brave Anzac Soldiers liberated Beersheba for the sons and daughters of Abraham and opened the gateway for the Jewish people to re-enter this stage of history...brave soldiers who are buried here played a crucial role in defeating the Ottoman Empire, liberating the Holy Land and ending 400 years of Ottoman rule in one great dash.¹

Australian Prime Minister Malcolm Turnbull added:

It did not create the state of Israel but enabled its creation...They defied history. They made history and with their courage they fulfilled history.²

Immediately after the service, the dignitaries opened a new ANZAC museum adjacent to the cemetery. Following this, the band led a parade of the horses through the streets lined with thousands of flag-waving school children, Israelis and overseas visitors. A contingent of aborigines represented their forefathers who served in the ANZAC troops and were enthusiastically welcomed and honoured by the crowds.



The official party then drove up to Tel Be'er Sheva where there was a New Zealand commemoration and a new monument was opened to remember the soldiers who fought to capture this strategic, ancient tel.

Almost at the exact time of the charge, the re-enactment ceremony began. The 100 horses walked the distance 'in peace' for the Prime Ministers, followed shortly after by a gallop from a smaller group, much to the delight of the thousands who filled the stands.

Jim & Jeannette's trip was 17 days in total, they had time in Israel & Jordan and travelled in a bullet proof bus which made them feel very safe and non-threatened at all times.

May Dinner Speaker: Ron Surtees



In charge of Audio Visual (AV) and Media at the Catalyst Church in Ipswich, Ron Surtees has been a vital member of the church's staff for the past 28 years. Ron's working life has been centred around AV technology and its use to capture information relevant to the world's media, as he built a career that eventually led to him holding a position as a Senior Cameraman at Channel 10.

As he entered the AV world in what would now be considered its infancy, much of Ron's knowledge was gleaned from the experiences of his colleagues in the field. The 1956 Melbourne Olympics were one such place where the inexperienced were placed in a situation that forced them to experiment with technology in ways that it had not been used before, in order to broadcast the events satisfactorily to the world's emerging television market. Ron will give us a rarely seen insight into the world on the other end of the television camera, from a time when the how-to and why-for of the cameraman's job were not limited by what they were taught at film school, but only by their imagination.

Tree Planting

Rotary International President 2017/18, Ian Riseley, challenged every Rotary club worldwide to make a difference by planting one tree for each of its members between the start of the Rotary year on 1 July and Earth Day on 22 April 2018. If this goal is achieved, an estimated 1.2 million new trees should be planted bringing a great deal of ongoing benefits the environment. DISTRICT ASSEMBLY - Sunday 20th May 2018


