running (the hot chips on a drizzly day proved to be a great hit), and our rib fillet burgers served with a homemade tomato relish were as popular as and tastier than ever. We would like to thank the attendees for their generosity, and hopefully next year will prove to just as successful. But more importantly, hopefully we won't have the specter of drought hanging over us again.







District Governor Terry Brown

District Governor Terry Brown and his wife Carol made their first visit to our club for the year. Terry started off the night by giving us a brief overview of his journey and goals for the coming year. Terry spoke about the inspiration he gets from Rotary International President Barry Rassin from the Bahama's. This years' theme 'Be the Inspiration' and logo which depicts waves

in shades of blue, represents the sea that connects us all together. DG Terry's goals for the coming year overlap with RI goals in many ways. District goals include each club gaining new member; to establish 6 new Satellite Clubs; for every club to contribute \$100 US to the Rotary Foundation; for every club to contribute \$40 US to End Polio; for all clubs to support nominations for all Youth Programs and for all clubs to achieve a Presidential Citation. DG Terry spoke about the 2018/19 Conference to be held at the Lismore Workers Club from 29-31 March 2019. The conference holds many memories for the Rotary Members of Lismore as it is the anniversary of the 2017 floods. Guest speakers include Ridley Bell ho is the founder/owner of Mountain Blue farms in NSW; Professor



Peter Silburn AM who is a world expert neurologist in the treatment of Parkinson's disease; Clyde Campbell who in 1987 founded Machinery Automation & Robotics; Sarah Brown who is a remote area nurse that reshaped 'on country' dialysis services for Aboriginal people in central

Australia; Kelly Foran from Glen Innes who created Friendly Faces Helping Hands in 2011; Rhettt Butler who is Foundation Chairman of SkyJuice and Chair of the Research Committee at National Centre for Excellence for Desalination (NCED); Dr Jonathan Parkyn a teaching academic and researcher at Southern Cross University; Corrina Grace who is the Founder and Executive Director of SERES; Perter Drysdale AM and Jo-Anne Wigg (Jo). DG Terry is promoting the conference as 'Lismore Heart of the Rivers' and presented President Andrew with a

heart with our clubs name on it. DG Terry's also spoke about the drought funding and the involvement the Rotary has with District support toward the ongoing appeal. The District helped to fund the Burrumbuttock Hay Run which has been delivering hay to drought affected areas since 2014, founder Brendan 'Bumpa' Farrell has completed 11 hay runs to properties in NSW & QLD. RAWCS (Rotary Australia World Community Service) in conjunction with the National Farmers Federation, Channel 9 and Rotary in Australia established an appeal which as raised in excess of \$10 million, with \$4.5 already being distributed direct to farmers and their families.

Human Brain Research Project. The goal is to raise funds for a PhD candidate for research into Parkinson's Disease. DG Terry concluded his visit with the presentation of a PHF for one of our most deserving members, Lindy Kirchner. Lindy is a Past President and has shown

Guest Speaker - Anna Martin

On Wednesday 12 September we welcomed Anna to talk to us about her journey to becoming a Veterinarian in Laidley. Anna was born in Brisbane and was the eldest child to her parents John & Nell, then when she was 4years old she was joined by her brother John. Until the age of 6 her family lived jointly between Brisbane and her grandparents commercial and stud Simmental farm in Mt Colliery, near Killarney. Anna started school at Bulimba State School but every weekend and school holidays were spent helping out at the farm. Anna considers herself to be very lucky as she grew up having the 'best of both worlds'. When she was 7 years old her parents separated, but instead of this having a negative effect on Anna she considers it to be one of the best things to happen as after her mother remarried she was blessed with a little sister, Ella as well as an extra parent Matt who considered Anna and her brother John as his own. Anna then attended high school at Somerville House where she played Hockey, was very

involved in Pony Club and enjoyed riding and competing as well as 'studying her butt off' to get herself into vet school. She was very fortunate in always knowing exactly what she wanted to do, so after finishing high school she was accepted into James Cook University to study a Bachelor of Veterinary Science. At 17 years of age Anna put everything she thought she would need into one suitcase and a carry-on bag and moved to Townsville. She admits that the humidity was a bit of a shock, but they were ultimately the most exciting, stressful and emotional 5 years of her life. During her final year Anna did a 2



month externship at the University of Tennessee in Knoxville, which has the newest and biggest large animal medicine and surgery facility in the USA. She spent half her time there in the Production Animal Medicine/Surgery Hospital and the other half in the Equine Medicine ward.





The externship gave Anna the chance to treat a huge variety of species and to work on cases that economically are not an option in Australia.

At her graduation in December 2016 Anna had all four of her parents and her Nan on hand to watch as she proudly walked across the stage accept her degree in her pappy's old university gown. Soon after graduation Anna moved to the Lockyer Valley to be close to her partner Lachlan and started working full time as an associate Veterinarian at the Laidley Veterinarian Surgery working as a mixed practice vet that treats small animals as well as the production of animals and horses. Some of Anna's big passions in the industry are bovine reproduction and herd health medicine. Anna calls herself a very lucky little human because she can say without a doubt that she adores the work she does and she's sure this was what she was put on the planet to do – not many people can honestly say that.

Peak Crossing Car Day


